




Housing Permit Activity 1990-2019




Single Family Detatched Housing (2017-2021)

Housing Type (2021)




Most (78%) of Windsor's housing is single-family detached housing.

Housing with 20 or more units comprises 3% of the Town's housing.










After Interstate 91 and 291, Route 20 (Bradley International Airport Connector) carries the most traffic in Town.








"National Historic Landmarks are buildings, sites, districts, structures, and objects that have been determined by the Secretary of the Interior to be nationally significant in American history and culture. Many of the most renowned historic properties in the nation are Landmarks. Mount Vernon, Pearl Harbor, the Apollo Mission Control Center, Alcatraz, and Martin Luther King's Birthplace are Landmarks that illustrate important contributions to the nation's historical development" (National Parks Service).

Properties listed on the National Register of Historic Places are properties "worthy of preservation". Properties listed on the National Register are also included in State and local registers.

Windsor has seen a steady stream of new businesses since 2019.





Windsor's median household income is higher than that of the State and the County's










Milo Peck Child Development Center

This facility is home to the Windsor Montessori School, which is an accredited program serving children 18 months to 6 years old. The Town also has a Parent Resource Center in this building.

Windsor Food Bank:

The Windsor Food Bank operates at the L.P. Wilson Community Center and assists Windsor residents who are experiencing a crisis or who have a limited income.

Senior Services:

Windsor's Senior Center is located in the L.P. Wilson Community Center. The Town offers a variety of recreation, preventative care, social and transportation programs, as well as a lunch program for seniors.

Adult Education Program:

The Adult Education program serves the educational needs of adult Windsor residents through several evening programs offered each spring and fall at Windsor High School and the L.P. Wilson Community Center.

Community Centers:

Windsor is home to The The L.P. Wilson Community Center on Matianuck Avenue as well as the Community Center at 330 Windsor Avenue. The L.P. Wilson Community Center performing arts, ceramics and senior citizen programs, and provides meeting rooms. The Community Center at 330 Windsor Avenue hosts many recreation programs, the Police Athletic League and the Caring Connection Adult Day Health Center.

Shad Derby:

The Shad Derby is an annual festival sponsored by the Windsor Shad Fest Bureau in May on the Town Green.
