






Mobility and Infrastructure



Roadway Classifications

- Arterials: provide the highest level of mobility, connecting major urban centers and facilitating long-distance travel. These include Interstates and principal arterials.
- Collectors: serve as links between local roads and arterials, balancing access and mobility. They collect traffic from local roads and channel it to the arterial system.
- Local Roads: prioritize access to adjacent land over mobility, serving residential areas, small businesses, and local trips.



Average Daily Traffic




High Traffic Volumes on:

Community Feedback



Key Themes:

Safety & Accessibility

- Address speeding concerns to improve roadway safety
- Enhance ADA accessibility to ensure equitable mobility for all users
- Implement traffic calming measures in high-risk areas
- Improve truck traffic safety, especially around Day Hill

Pedestrian & Bicycle Infrastructure

- Fill sidewalk gaps to create a continuous pedestrian network
- Add more crosswalks and enhance visibility at crossings
- Develop protected bike lanes to encourage safe cycling

Transit & Multimodal Options

- Expand micro transit and circulator bus services for local connectivity
- Improve train frequency and CT Transit routing for better regional access
- Promote carpooling options to reduce congestion

Sustainable Transportation

- Install solar canopies over parking lots to generate clean energy
- Add EV charging stations and transition to an electric vehicle fleet

Parking & Downtown Access

Draft Goal



Expand transportation options and infrastructure to improve mobility and accessibility for all residents. Prioritize upgrades to transportation networks, utilities, and public facilities to create a resilient, sustainable community capable of meeting both current and future needs.

Strategy 1: Encourage transportation infrastructure improvements that improve the accessibility and safety for all users and enhance transportation sustainability.



- 1. Develop a comprehensive plan to evaluate the pedestrian access network throughout the Town and complete segments of missing sidewalks.
- 2. Provide improvements to pedestrian crossings as needed including crosswalk markings, signage, signal enhancements, and lighting enhancements.
- 3. Implement traffic calming measures and continue enforcement to reduce speeding.
- 4. Provide appropriate bicycle facilities (shared roadway, bicycle lanes, etc.), as feasible, when road improvements (such as resurfacing) are undertaken.
- 5. Set aside funds for the establishment of bicycle routes, where appropriate (with pavement markings and signage as needed).
- 6. Ensure that sidewalks and pedestrian crossings are ADA accessible and remove any barriers to accessibility through ongoing maintenance.
- 7. Continue to foster strong partnerships with CT DOT, DECD, CRCOG, and other local and regional partners to implement a well-balanced and sustainable multimodal transportation system.
- 8. Consider developing a Complete Streets Policy to guide transportation improvements.
- 9. Parking considerations?

Strategy 2: Support the expansion and improvement of WINDSOR 2035 transit services across Windsor and the region.

- 1. Work with CTtransit to identify improvements to increase accessibility and service on intra- and intertown transit routes.
- 2. Upgrade bus shelters through CTDOT's bus stop enhancement program.
- 3. Coordinate with CTtransit to maintain and expand transit and paratransit services and access, particularly to older adults and disabled population in the town.
- 4. Action related to the train station?

Strategy 3: Reduce dependency on fossil fuels in transportation and support sustainable forms of transportation.



- 1. Continue to transition the municipal fleet to electric vehicles.
- 2. Continue to pursue grant opportunities for installing electric vehicle charging stations at municipal sites and commercial areas.
- 3. Work with major employers in the Town to avoid the use of single occupancy vehicles through carpooling, ride sharing, biking/walking to work, and using transit service.

Strategy 4: Maintain and Enhance Utility Infrastructure



- 1. Continue to work with the Metropolitan District Commission (MDC) to improve and expand public water supply and public sewer service to residents and businesses.
- 2. Explore potential for placement of powerlines underground when opportunities present themselves.

Strategy 5: Reduce flooding along the Town's major windsor 2035 roadways and in neighborhoods and commercial areas BUILDING OUR FUTURE TOGETHER

- 1. Continue ongoing maintenance and clean-outs of municipal catch basins.
- 2. Address the drainage needs through infrastructure improvements and better planning for future drainage needs.
- 3. Perform engineering studies to determine the best way to protect infrastructure subject to extreme flooding and allocate funding to implement the recommendations.
- 4. Implement the Best Management Practices of the 2017 Windsor Stormwater Management Plan.



WINDSOR 2035 BUILDING OUR FUTURE TOGETHER

Milo Peck Child Development Center

This facility is home to the Windsor Montessori School, which is an accredited program serving children 18 months to 6 years old. The Town also has a Parent Resource Center in this building.

Windsor Food Bank:

The Windsor Food Bank operates at the L.P. Wilson Community Center and assists Windsor residents who are experiencing a crisis or who have a limited income.

Senior Services:

Windsor's Senior Center is located in the L.P. Wilson Community Center. The Town offers a variety of recreation, preventative care, social and transportation programs, as well as a lunch program for seniors.

Adult Education Program:

The Adult Education program serves the educational needs of adult Windsor residents through several evening programs offered each spring and fall at Windsor High School and the L.P. Wilson Community Center.

Community Centers:

Windsor is home to The The L.P. Wilson Community Center on Matianuck Avenue as well as the Community Center at 330 Windsor Avenue. The L.P. Wilson Community Center performing arts, ceramics and senior citizen programs, and provides meeting rooms. The Community Center at 330 Windsor Avenue hosts many recreation programs, the Police Athletic League and the Caring Connection Adult Day Health Center.

Shad Derby:

The Shad Derby is an annual festival sponsored by the Windsor Shad Fest Bureau in May on the Town Green.

Draft Goal



Deliver high-quality, fiscally responsible community services and facilities that adapt to the evolving needs of residents, supporting individuals and families at every stage of life. Prioritize accessible resources for children, teens, seniors, and families, while fostering a vibrant, inclusive Town Center and promoting civic pride.

Strategy 1: Ensure that Windsor continues to adequately serve its residents, property owners, and businesses with community services.



- 1. Continue to monitor the evolving needs of the community and seek input on desired services that could benefit Windsor's residents.
- 2. Develop a plan to address the emerging needs of an aging population (i.e. housing, adult daycare and additional services for older adults).
- 3. Continue to support the Windsor Fire Department and Windsor Police Department through the continued support of the Windsor Police Cadets program.
- 4. Address accessibility needs of the population in utilizing Town Facilities and Services.
- 5. Regularly evaluate and prioritize community facility needs in order to address needs in an efficient and economical way.
- 6. Develop a maintenance schedule to assure that all Town buildings and properties undergo regular repairs and maintenance to minimize the dramatically high costs brought on by years of postponed repairs.
- 7. Collaborate with neighboring and regional municipalities and organizations to consolidate duplicate services where feasible.

Strategy 2: Promote events and activities that contribute to community pride and spirit.



- 1. Continue to promote community events throughout all of Windsor to support community cohesion and vibrancy across the Town.
- 2. Continue to update the Town's website to ensure that residents have access to community information.
- 3. Promote and encourage volunteerism.
- 4. Continue to develop partnerships for sponsoring community events.

Strategy 3: Prioritize improvements to the Town's facilities to meet diverse program needs.



- 1. Conduct a Town facilities assessment to assess current and future needs, find ways to improve energy efficiency, and explore options for consolidating and reusing facilities.
- 2. Address accessibility needs of the physically disabled population in utilizing Town facilities and services.
- 3. Increase the capital budget funding to meet the maintenance needs of the Town's facilities.

Strategy 4: Promote Sustainability and Resiliency



- Continue to make improvements and conduct activities as recommended by the Town's Stormwater Management Plan.
- 2. Promote the adoption of best management practices (such as rain barrels, green roofs, etc.), and the use of green infrastructure (such as bio-swales and rain gardens) as a means of reducing the impacts from stormwater runoff.
- 3. Review and evaluate the development of Low Impact Development (LID) standards within the Town's zoning and subdivision regulations, and inland wetlands and watercourses regulations.
- 4. Continue to participate in the Sustainable CT program and strive to achieve the highest certification standard possible through the voluntary implementation of various actions aimed at sustainability.
- 5. Partner in regional and state-wide initiatives to address borderless climate change issues.
